

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The Farming Community Network Are investigating the Impact of TB

The FCN have launched new research into the impact that the threat of TB and the compulsory control measures are having on farmers and their families in the UK.

"(The questionnaire) has been designed with input from colleagues and academics and is to be shared with livestock/cattle farmers in the UK. FCN want as many farmers as possible to fill it in so that we can gain a wealth of data from across the whole of the UK. It should take no more than 10 minutes to complete.

The results of the survey will help FCN to better understand how farmers and farm families perceive the threat of bTB, helping us to support those at risk or affected by a bTB breakdown."

BlowFly Alert from NADIS

Recent hot weather has increased the strike risk substantially throughout the UK. The dry weather initially made animals less susceptible to strike. However, now that the fly population has grown, the rainfall over the past few weeks has increased the strike risk quickly, particularly in lambs.

Most ewes should now be sheared, and the short fleece should offer some protection until it regrows. However, if you haven't already, it is appropriate to treat your stock with a fly preventative. A full list of the options for fly control in sheep can be found here:

As well as shearing + regular dagging, local fly traps can make a real difference to the number of pests affecting your stock. Most flies will be local to a single field, with a maximum flight range of one mile (data from SCOPS and Oxford University). This means you can have a real impact on their numbers using basic traps. These are most effective early on in the season, and have been shown to reduce numbers by up to 80%, significantly reducing fly worry (and therefore increasing grazing time and growth rates!) of your stock.

Cull Ewe Screen

Post weaning, whilst sorting your ewes to cull or tup, please remember that (as last year) we will be offering discounted rates on blood sampling your cull ewes to screen for common diseases. You can check your flock's status by screening five ewes for the included diseases of

Enzootic abortion, Johnes, Border Disease and Maedi Visna for just £25 per ewe, with no additional vet time or materials charges. This represents a saving of £15 per ewe so please contact us for details!
