Winter Weight Gain

The cold wet weather and darker evenings during the winter months can make your normal dog walks seem less than appealing. You may even find that your dog doesn't want to go out either! However, any reduction in exercise levels at this time of the year could result in joint stiffness or weight gain for your dog.

If your pooch is reluctant to head out in cooler weather, a doggy coat may help keep them cosy and encourage them outside. Make sure to avoid icy roads and pavements and clean your dog's paws when you return home to remove salt or grit which could cause irritation.

If you are unable to go out, keep your dog active and entertained by playing indoor games with them. You could teach them a new trick, set up obstacle courses or play games like hide and seek.

With the help of Olivia, Bella's owners were able to ensure Bella lost the weight she had gained in a safe and controlled way, enabling her to reach her ideal target weight. Bella has done extremely well losing 4kg since starting her weight loss journey. Her owners report that since loosing weight Bella's energy levels have increased and she seems much happier in herself.





Keep Hedgehogs Safe on Bonfire Night

Woodpiles are ideal places for hedgehogs to take shelter and if they mistake your bonfire for a cozy resting place this puts them in real danger. Sadly, many hedgehogs fall foul of un-checked bonfires and are killed because of it.


Here are 8 tips to help you avoid harming hedgehogs in your bonfire pile as recommended by the Wildlife Trust (https://www.wildlifetrusts.org/actions/how-check-your-bonfire-hedgehogs):

- 1. Build it on the same day that you will light it. The longer it's left for, the more likely it is that a hedgehog will wander in.
- 2. Place chicken wire one metre high, at an outward angle, all the way around the bottom while you're building it.
- 3. If you have stored materials for your bonfire outdoors then move them to a different patch of ground.
- 4. Always place the bonfire on open ground never on a pile of leaves as a hedgehog may be hiding underneath.
- 5. Always check the entire bonfire for hedgehogs before lighting it. They tend to hide in the centre and bottom two feet in particular.
- 6. When checking, lift parts of the bonfire section by section using a pole or broom. Do not use a fork, spade or rake as this may injure a hedgehog.
- 7. Use a torch to look inside the bonfire and listen for a hissing sound, as this is the noise that hedgehogs make when they are disturbed or distressed.
- 8. Always light your bonfire from one corner, rather than in the centre, in order to give hedgehogs a chance to escape if they need to.

If you do find a hedgehog then move slowly and calmly. Pick it up with gardening gloves, along with any nesting material it may have been sitting in, and place it in a cardboard box lined with newspaper. Relocate the box to a safe location that is far from any fires or wait until the bonfire is over and dampen down the fire site with water before releasing the hedgehog under a bush or a log pile.



Important Information Regarding Cat Vaccines



The plan going forward is to honour appointments already booked and continue to book kitten/2nd vaccines as normal, as well as first year boosters. For all other boosters, we are looking at extending them to 2-3 months past when they are due, by which point we are hoping to have more vaccines in stock.

If you are part of the Castle Care Club your vaccination reminder will now only be sent out when your cat is coming up to the 3 month overdue mark. The reminders will be sent 4 weeks before that point, to give you plenty of time to get them booked.

Nigel Hicks – much loved and highly respected Veterinary Surgeon


Nigel Hicks has reached the amazing milestone of being in Veterinary Practice for 50 years!
