#### **Dairy Herdsperson Course**

<u>Due to our sold-out 2024 course,</u> Castle Vets is again running a dairy herdsperson course in 2025! Attend six tailored sessions on Dairy cow and calf health, to gain your Herdsperson certification.

This course will be run over summer 2025, with sessions held 10:30am-2:30pm, at roughly two-weekly intervals. All sessions will be on local farms and made up of theory and practical components.



- Triaging + treating the sick cow 3<sup>rd</sup> June (Tues)
- Managing + preventing lameness 9th June (Mon)
- Fertility and calving tips + tricks 25<sup>th</sup> June (Weds)
- Calf management, housing + vaccines 7<sup>th</sup> July (Mon)
- Mastitis + drying off 21st July (Mon)
- Cow nutrition + deficiencies 6<sup>th</sup> August (Weds)

Each module will be delivered on a different farm by a core group of vets . This course is being designed, overseen and run by our vet Lucy, who holds a PGCert(VetEd) in higher education. This small group experience, with on-farm assessments, will result in superior learning and certification.



### **Ordering Medication**

Our medicines ordering policy is in place to ensure all prescriptions can be approved, processed, and supplied before our branches close each day. With that in mind, please be advised the latest time to place an order for same day collection at Launceston is now 5pm.

After this time, we are still happy to take your meds order over the phone, but it will be processed at the start of the next working day. In addition, to help you keep on top of your medicine stock, we also now offer online medicines ordering. This is available 24hours a day, via our website, and we aim to complete all orders within one working day:

If you wish to order through our Liskeard branch, please place your order by 3:30pm for next day collection.

All requests are reviewed by a veterinary surgeon, who may ring you back, if any clarification or discussion is needed before they can prescribe your drugs.

### Red Tractor - Updated Medicines Course Requirement

Red Tractor now require someone on accredited beef and sheep holdings to have attended a medicine handling course *within the last five years*. This will affect most farms in 2025, as the original requirement for Medicines course attendance was introduced between 2018-2019.



Therefore, we have updated our in-person training and will begin running courses again this summer:

- May 27<sup>th</sup> 3.30-5.30pm, Lifton Community Centre
- July 8<sup>th</sup> 5.30pm-7.30pm, Lifton Community Centre

### **Blue Tongue Virus Vaccination**

We have had a fantastic response from our clients in the face of the new Blue Tongue Virus strain entering East Devon, *with over 21,000 doses of BTV-3 vaccine prescribed by our vets so far*! This means thousands of stock have been protected, with more farms currently on our waiting list.

As Cornwall and most of Devon is naive to this strain of virus, we are at high risk of deaths and illness this summer once the virus begins to replicate again. As predicted, we have already seen different brands of BTV-3 vaccine go out of stock or become unavailable.

# Clinical Impact in Netherlands, Denmark, Belgium and Germany (prior to vaccine being created):

• **Sheep**: Severe symptoms, including lameness and mouth ulceration, led to a 75% mortality rate in those affected. Surviving sheep often required euthanasia due to long-term health issues.

# Dead stock collection services overwhelmed and mortality recording poor, due to high losses.

- Cattle: Milk production dropped for up to ten weeks after infection (1.15kg/cow/day), with prolonged recovery times and significant economic losses. Dummy calves also seen where dams infected during pregnancy. Lameness and mouth lesions can also affect cattle, though death is less common than in sheep.
- Other Species: Cases were also reported in goats, alpacas, and dogs.

#### Vaccination status of European countries:

- Belgium: plan to make BTV-3 vaccination mandatory in 2025, due to their carcass collection system becoming overwhelmed, and restrictions in trade impacting the economy
- Germany: over 1 million sheep and 2 million cattle vaccinated in 2024
- **France**: 11 million vaccine doses precured and distributed, though lack of coordination has been criticized by farmers
- Vaccination campaigns are also underway in the Netherlands, Denmark, Spain, Portugal, Austria and Switzerland, as well as here in the UK
